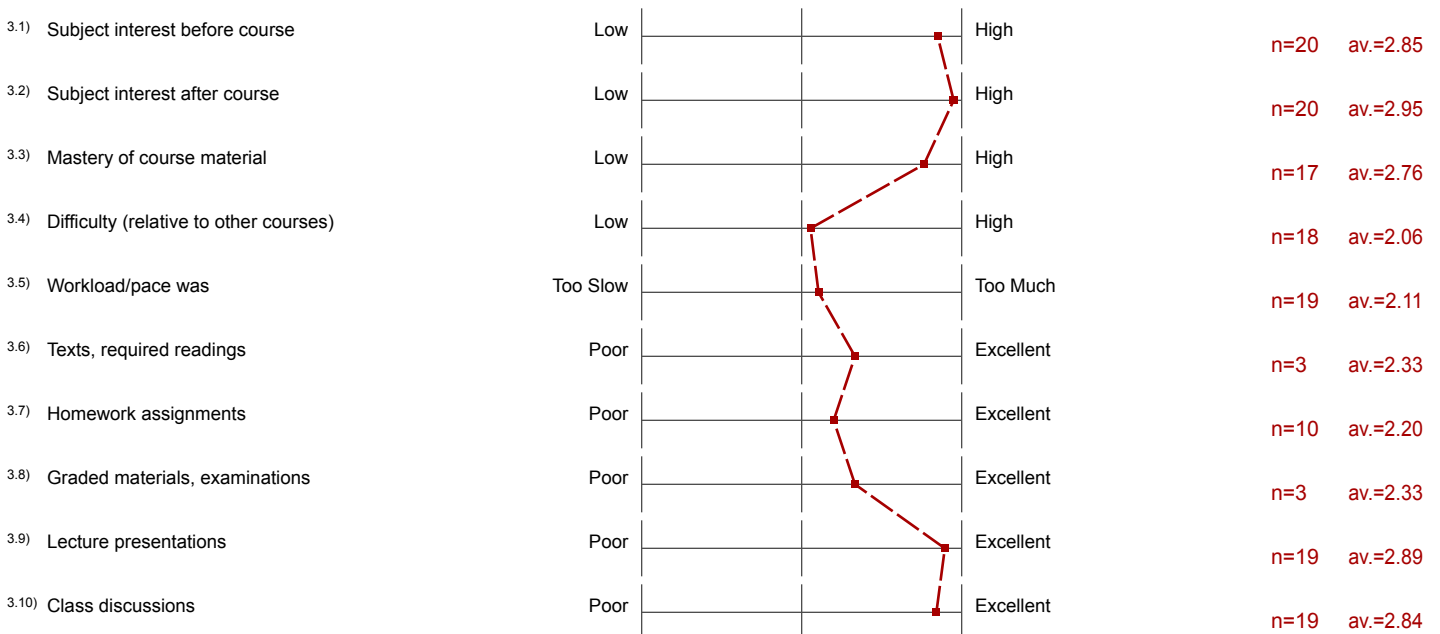

- 4.1) Please identify what you perceive to be the real strengths and weaknesses of this instructor and course.
- As always, being a part of Professor Fessler's anthro lab is a pleasure. Listening to Dr. Fessler's fireside chat's always leave me inspired because he always has something interesting to say. I do have to admit, I was kind of bummed this quarter because I felt that our funding arrived so late. I wanted to get more involved and work with more data and run more studies, but it was hard to do so when we basically kicked off our study towards the end of the quarter. (Of course, this is not your fault at all, Dr. F!). I enjoy how easily approachable Dr. Fessler is, and I feel very comfortable asking him for advice in many aspects of my life.
 - Dr. Fessler's lab is invaluable to students seeking research experience in the behavioral sciences. The lecture portion provides an informal, seminar style refresher on the theoretical underpinnings of the current projects, and while the actual research assistant work itself really helps you get a feel for the moving parts of social science research. It's been a very rewarding experience and something I would highly recommend.
 - FessLab is one of my most valued activities at UCLA. Dr. Fessler is an incredibly engaging, thoughtful, and insightful professor, and FessLab not only offers Research Assistants the opportunity to "see how the sausage gets made" when it comes to the production of scientific knowledge, it also allows students the opportunity to learn from a world-class professor. In FessLab I've discussed groundbreaking research in the field of anthropology, I've learned to come out of my shell when recruiting participants on the streets, and perhaps most valuably, I've had the opportunity to apply the principles and concepts of my anthropology courses to the real world. Whether Dr. Fessler is leading a discussion about our thoughts/opinions regarding the lab's current experiment, giving us a breakdown of what's happening in the world of anthropologic research, or diving into one of his "fireside chats" about life outside the classroom, he always manages to make FessLab a highlight of my week.  - Fessler is always concerned with his students' learning whether it be on the material in class or just for life in general. Student input on different research aspects are always welcomed and actively sought after and this makes students feel a sense of ownership and pride in the lab's work. I love that I've learned so much about research and about different life skills from my time in Fessler's lab.
 - I thought that the course material was very interesting, and I enjoyed the opportunity to participate in undergraduate research at UCLA in this particular topic.
 - I took this course last quarter as well, and I've found that while last quarter it helped me develop my critical thinking skills in a broad way, this quarter has developed my critical thinking skills in a much sharper way; I've become better at asking illuminating questions rather than simply taking research results or claims at face value. Also, watching Professor Fessler and Colin Holbrook reach unexpected results on their studies and participating in discussions about why their results either refuted their initial predictions or complicated them has given me something valuable. Instead of simply failing and trying again, I am learning how to fail and effectively reason through why a failure occurred before trying again. My time and my efforts have become infinitely more valuable as a result. These are lessons I can take with me anywhere and that I haven't found in other courses. I'm grateful for not only the lessons I've learned but also for the opportunity to participate in discussions with doctors Fessler and Holbrook and get that immediate feedback from them.
 - I'm so glad I was able to be a research assistant for Dr. Fessler! It was a really great experience and I loved being "behind the scenes." It's really helpful to go more into depth and it is also fun to get to know Dr. F and Colin a bit better. Very valuable experience.
